Selecting Your Frame

The Importance of the Frame's Top Rail Profile:

Before design theme and color, your gate's frame sets the stage for what's to come. The top rail profile is the single biggest driver of its overall character.

Each profile in the design palette below gives a different effect to the character of the entire entrance.

An arched top rail *concentrates focus* towards the center; a bell arch moreso, while a flat top rail *diffuses focus* much more evenly. A dipped arch *shifts the focus* toward the outer ends and has a more welcoming feel.

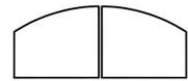

If your main concern is property security you would likely be drawn to a frame that looks more imposing such as the bell arch or a high arch. Conversely, a dipped profile aligns more with a prioritization of making guests feel welcome.

Selecting The Proper Gate Size To Match Your Lifestyle and Aspirations:

Why Driveway Width is Only Half the Equation

Most companies will simply ask, "How wide is your driveway?" and hand you a standard premade 12-foot or 14-foot gate. But sizing a custom estate gate isn't just about spanning a gap of asphalt. It is also about matching the physical dimensions of the entrance to the daily function of your property.

To get the size right, we suggest looking directly at the primary goal you selected for your entrance.

Custom engineering means designing dimensions that accommodate your lifestyle. A custom gate builder will fabricate your gate to the exact number of inches required to best meet your needs. The goal isn't just to fill a space; you want the gate built to achieve the specific goals you feel are most important.

1. When Prioritizing Security and Privacy:

The Strategy: To create a truly impenetrable boundary, a vertical height of 7' to 8' tall prevents scaling and prying eyes. Tight tolerances between the gate frame and your masonry block both sightlines and physical entry.

2. When Prioritizing Architectural Prestige:

The Strategy: A high-end estate is made even more impressive with grand scale. Consider expanding the gate width to an 18-foot, 20-foot or even 24' dual-swing layout. This provides the "canvas" needed for custom artwork to shine, ensuring the arrival feels prestigious and unhurried rather than cramped.

3. When Prioritizing Animal Containment:

The Strategy: For the goal of containing smaller family pets, the bottom rail and ground clearance can be critical. Precise picket spacing ("puppy pickets") on the lower half ensures even small animals remain safely within your grounds. Larger animals such as horses need a minimum of 5' in vertical height anywhere along the top rail.

Before finalizing your width, we suggest a *visualization exercise*: either mark the proposed opening with a couple of cones or chairs, or ask friends or family members to stand in place. Drive your widest vehicle - whether that is an SUV, a dually truck, or a horse trailer - through the gap. This simple exercise instantly reveals whether your proposed clearance allows for a relaxed, easy arrival.

Which Material Type Is Right for Your Property?

Once you've settled on a frame profile and size, the material type determines how your frame performs over time. The two main types of material used in gate fabrication are **aluminum** and **steel**.

Here's how steel and aluminum compare:

Material	Best For	Maintenance	Lifespan
Steel	Detail and strength, plasma-cut designs; the most design flexibility for wildlife scenes, trees, and custom silhouettes	Requires a high quality powder-coat with zinc rich primer base to prevent rust. Low maintenance.	40+ years with proper finish and occasional touch-up
Aluminum	Coastal or high-humidity climates; lighter-weight gates make the automatic gate opener's job easier.	Rust-proof but corrodes if not properly powder coated; no maintenance, less rigid, difficult to fabricate.	30+ years

Once you have established your core priority and size, the material you choose dictates how your entrance will perform against the elements and daily use. Here is how to match the material to your specific lifestyle:

Mild Steel: Gets the Edge For Durability & As a Canvas for Custom Art

If your priority is making a breathtaking first impression with custom silhouettes, wildlife scenes, or intricate lettering, mild steel is a slightly better choice.

- **How it serves you:** Steel offers uncompromising rigidity and allows for the finest detail in plasma-cut designs. It is structurally dense, making it ideal for maximizing security and creating a heavy, commanding presence at your entrance.
- **What to look for:** The traditional fear with steel is rust. To protect your investment, ensure your gate is engineered with a multi-step, oven-baked finish. You specifically want one utilizing a zinc-rich primer base rather than standard wet paint. This guarantees the gate remains pristine for at least two decades without demanding constant upkeep.

Aluminum: Rust-Free & Easier on Automation If you are planning an exceptionally wide dual-swing entrance where reducing stress on the automation motors is important, weight becomes the primary concern.

- **How it serves you:** Aluminum is naturally immune to rust and is only 1/3rd the weight of steel. This dramatic reduction in weight takes much of the daily stress off gate operators, ensuring your entrance opens flawlessly every single time you press the button and extending the life of your motors.
- **What to look for:** Because aluminum is naturally less rigid, large spans require advanced structural welding to prevent warping during fabrication and sagging after installation.

Mixed Materials: Warmth and Contemporary Contrast For estates, lodges, or modern ranches where an all-metal entrance might feel too industrial, integrating organic textures provides the perfect architectural balance.

- **How it serves you:** Pairing a metal frame with rich, natural cedar inlays instantly softens the aesthetic. It creates a warm, welcoming, and highly exclusive look that cannot be achieved with metal alone.
- **What to look for:** Wood exposed to the elements requires protection against UV fading and moisture. Utilizing charred, brushed cedar treated with premium oil-based finishes ensures the wood maintains its rich character and withstands the weather alongside the metal frame.

Choosing Your Own Design Theme

Design without compromise

This is where a fully customized gate surpasses just being a barrier and becomes a functional piece of art.

With precision *plasma-cutting*, you aren't limited to a gate frame filled with just a bunch of pickets. Your chosen design theme imagery can be integrated directly into the gate itself.

You can come up with any design theme you wish; in fact, we've helped hundreds of clients create their very own unique gate designs over the years.

A Few Popular Design Theme Considerations:

Sprawling oak tree with deer family:



This popular design features a large, sprawling oak or tree-of-life silhouette spanning the full width of the gate, its branches stretching outward with stamped oak leaves welded in place. This style can be customized with or without wildlife. Deer, rabbits, fawns, and other animals, even family pets, can be added among the tree's base and grasses to create a layered, storybook-like scene. This design pairs naturally with high-end rural, farm, or wooded properties.

Family pet silhouettes:





Add a personal touch by working custom silhouettes of your family pets into the gate's negative space. Dogs, cats, or other beloved animals are rendered in profile - resting, standing, or in motion - and integrated among a tree, grasses, and vertical pickets for a natural, layered look. Because each pet silhouette is custom-traced from a photo or reference, this style creates a truly one-of-a-kind, lasting tribute at the entrance to your home.

Scrollwork designs:



Scrollwork gates feature intricate spirals and curling silhouettes that create a dense, ornamental pattern across the entire panel. This style draws on traditional European wrought iron craftsmanship, often paired with an arched top rail for added grandeur. The scrollwork creates depth and visual texture while maintaining the openness needed for security and airflow.

Farmyard scenes:



This design showcases horses but if you have cattle, bison, or any other animals significant to your property we're able to render them in profile or full silhouette across the gate panel. Detail work like mane lines, muscle definition, and brand markings can be etched into the silhouette for added realism. An arched overhead sign bar is a popular addition, allowing the farm, ranch or property name to be added directly into the framework above the animal scene, creating a bold, custom entrance statement.

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The best gate themes tell visitors something true about the property and owner before they ever reach the front door.

Getting the Scale & Placement Right

Where designs often go wrong

A design theme can be breathtaking or it can just look cluttered. The difference almost always comes down to scale, placement, and restraint, not necessarily just the quality of the artwork itself.

1. Anchor the scene, don't scatter it. A few well-placed silhouettes read as intentional. Many small silhouettes scattered across the panel may seem overly busy.
2. Respect the negative space. Negative space is what makes your design pop. Resist the urge to fill every single open area.
3. Consider viewing distance. A scene viewed from a car approaching at 15–20 mph reads very differently than the same design viewed up close. Fine detail can disappear at a distance; bold frames and silhouettes carry much further.
4. Balance both panels. On a dual swing gate, decide whether the scene should split evenly across both panels (reading as one image when closed) or repeat/mirror on each side.

A good designer walks you through a full-scale (or true-to-proportion) mockup before the first piece of metal is ever cut. Request a design overlay onto a photo of your entrance to preview the actual gate design on-site before any fabrication begins.

Choosing Your Powder Coat Finish

The decision that protects everything you just designed

The theme is the art, finish is what preserves and enhances it. It's also a commonly overlooked step and yet the one most responsible for whether a gate still looks sharp at year fifteen or is already rusting by month three.

Why Multi-Step, Oven-Baked Finishes Matter

A basic single-coat spray finish might look fine on day one, but it offers little protection against corrosion or chipping. A proper multi-step powder-coat process typically involves:

Media blasting or chemical cleaning to remove mill scale and contaminants before any coating is applied

A zinc-rich or epoxy primer for corrosion resistance at the metal surface

A base powder coat electrostatically applied and cured in an oven at high temperature, fusing the coating to the metal

A clear top coat in many specialty finishes, adding UV resistance and depth to the color

This process is what opens the door to thousands of rich, durable colors and textures — from deep matte blacks and bronzes to textured, hammered, or metallic finishes that a simple painted surface simply can't replicate.

Ask any gate builder exactly how many steps their finish process includes, and whether it's cured in an oven or air-dried. The answer tells you almost everything about how long the gate will hold its color.

Tip: Always request a physical color swatch card, not just a digital rendering. Powder-coat colors, especially metallics and textures, can shift noticeably depending on lighting and screen calibration.
